HONORING 30 YEARS OF REPRODUCTIVE JUSTICE

OVERVIEW

In Our Own Voice: National Black Women's Reproductive Justice Agenda kicked-off this year with the launch of its 2024 #RJVoter initiative making it clear that Reproductive Justice is on the ballot. Throughout the 2024 Election Cycle, this initiative will use the leadup to Election Day 2024 to highlight the importance of Reproductive Justice issues and why it is crucial for RJ Voters to make sure their voices are heard through their civic engagement efforts.

The Reproductive Justice multi-issue framework was created in 1994 by Black women. It provides a lived experience lens to inform choices at the ballot box in all elections- local, state, and federal this year and beyond.

An #RJVoter:

- Supports policies promoting comprehensive reproductive healthcare.
- Advocates for access to contraception and abortion.
- Emphasizes the ability to have and raise children in safe, healthy environments.
- Focuses on healthcare equity, including for women of color, low-income women, and LGBTQIA+ communifies.

Promotes sexual health education

Addresses maternal health issues.

- Opposes forced sterilization and unwanted contraception.
- Aims for a holistic approach to reproductive rights and justice.


About the Mothers of Reproductive Justice


July 29-31, 2024 marks the 30th Anniversary of that crucial work and we honor the 12 Founding Mothers of Reproductive Justice:

Dr. Toni M. Bond is a womanist theo-ethicist whose scholarship creates theologies that affirm Black women, their reproductive & sexual autonomy, and their relationship with God. In 1994, she became the first Black woman to run an abortion fund as the executive director of the Chicago Abortion Fund. In 1996, she co-founded and led the 1st Black women's reproductive justice organization in the U.S.	Terri James served with the Chicago Abortion Fund in 1994. She became a Legal Fellow in 1994, and finishing her fellowship went on to focus on entertainment law.	Honorable Cynthia Newbille was the Executive Director of the National Black Women's Health Project in 1994. She was elected to Richmond City Council for the East End 7th District in 2009 in a special election and then again in January 2013 for a four-year term.	Representative Able Mable Thomas' political career started when she was chosen as a presidential delegate for candidate Jesse Jackson at the 1984 DNC. The same year, she won a seat in the GA State House, becoming the youngest member of the General Assembly serving 4 terms. She gathered the 12 women to discuss what was missing from the Clinton health care plan.
Reverend Alma Crawford was 1 of 3 women of color in leadership at both the Religious Coalition for Reproductive Choice and Women of Color Partnership Program to sign the republished "We Remember" brochure in 1994. She started the Church of the Open Door of Chicago for the Black gay and lesbian community.	Dr. Bisola Marignay worked with the Black Women's Health Project's Chicago chapter. She is the author of Building Multicultural Alliances: A Practice Guide and Prayer Songs: Therapy That Aided a People's Survival.	Loretta Ross is a sterilization survivor who won a class action suit. She was a co-convener of the 2004 March for Women's Lives in DC and a co-founder of SisterSong. In 2022, she received the MacArthur Genius Award for shaping a visionary paradigm linking social justice, human rights, and Reproductive Justice.	Winnette Willis has dedicated herself to a lifetime of volunteerism serving women, families, and communities since the 1960s. In 1996, she co-founded Black Women for Reproductive Justice with Dr. Toni Bond.
The late Evelyn S. Field , was a distinguished and lifetime educator, women's & civil rights activist, a founding member of the Raritan Valley Community College Board of Trustees. She was a member of the Somerville Negro Civic Council & held many positions with the National Council of Negro Women on the local & national levels.	Cassandra McConnell worked for the Planned Parenthood of Greater Cleveland in the 1990s and then went on to work in DC in the community development and consumer protection field.	Elizabeth Ann Terry was the director of NARAL Pro-Choice America from 1985 to 1993. She became the Regional Coordinator of Keeping Women Healthy by providing administrative and logistical support for a legislative initiative to secure more funds for women's health care insurance.	Kim Youngblood worked for the National Black Women's Health Project as a legislative associate from 1994 to 1996. She then served as the primary liaison between the organization and other advocacy groups for women and people of color.


